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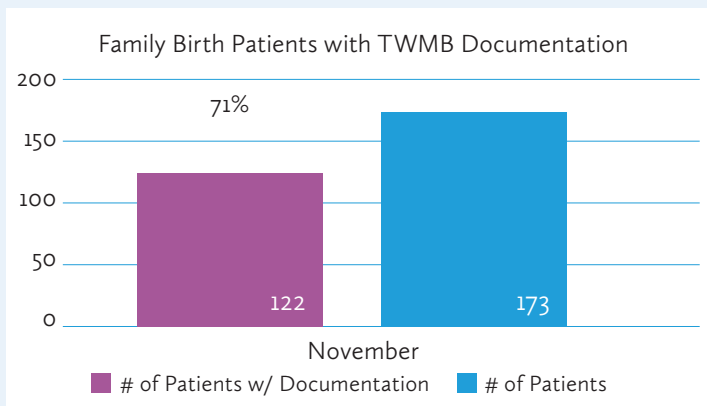
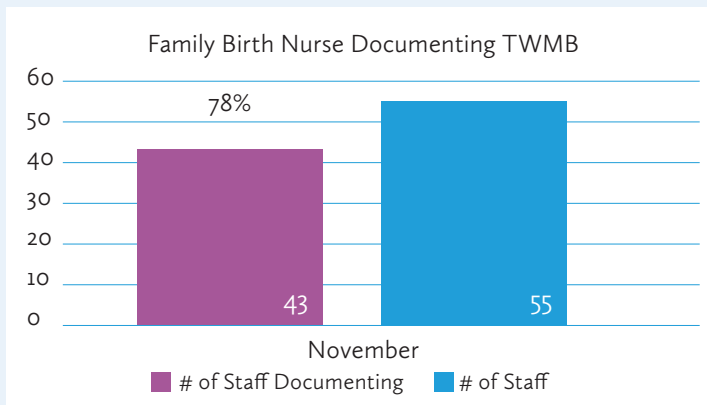
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Monthly Unit Snapshot Example Report

Data Observations

- 71% of patients reflected TWMB documentation in their electronic health record. This exceeds the Division goal.
- 78% of clinic nurses were reported as having documented TWMB concepts during the month of November. This is the same as last month's percentages and exceeds the Division goal of $\geq 70\%$.

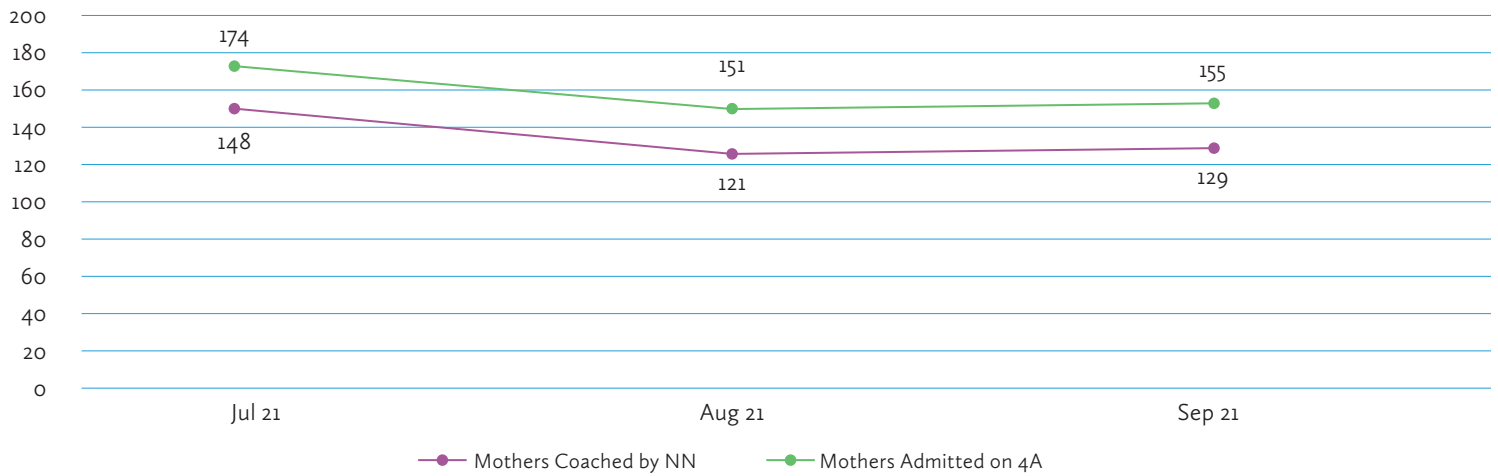

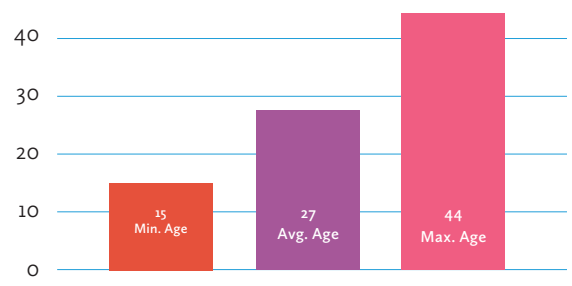

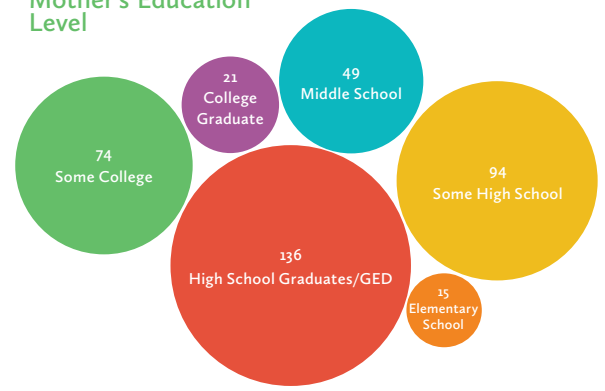
