A Note on Selecting Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Books and Materials

As you select books and materials in your classroom, consider these important questions: Are the books I share with my children . . . Developmentally appropriate? Available in the first languages of the children in my classroom, providing an opportunity to leverage first language as an asset? Opportunities for my children to see themselves and their families in positive, empowering ways? Whenever possible, written by an authentic author who is a member of the group being written about? Helping my children learn about people different from themselves, especially people not widely represented in children's literature? Provoking conversations about valuing yourself and others?

This list was specifically developed for dual language learners, children who are developing in two or more languages. While all children could benefit from resources included in this list, the resource specifically focuses on linguistic and cultural identities.

- Check out the list of winners and honorable mentions of the <u>Pura Belpré award</u> ("Presented annually to a Latino/Latina writer and illustrator whose work best portrays, affirms, and celebrates the Latino cultural experience in an outstanding work of literature for children and youth." Be sure to consider if the book option is developmentally appropriate for your age group)





Ideas for Multicultural & Multilingual Resources

The best first language supports and culturally responsive materials come directly from families of the children in your classroom. Collaborate with families to make books for your classroom library in their first languages and/or about their culture and ask them to help label key words in their first languages in English books in your library and to teach you songs. Ask families if they have food packaging and clothing typical of their culture for your dramatic play area, musical instruments for music and movement, and fabric and other materials for your craft area.

- Bilingual Puzzles like <u>BeginAgain's Counting Chameleon's Bilingual Wooden Numbers Puzzle</u>

- Puppets or felt board characters to support storytelling and other activities, especially sharing in English with dual language learners
- Instruments from around the world (homemade, collected, or purchased like <u>Lakeshore's</u> <u>Instruments from Around the World Collection</u>)
- Wordless pictures books: Bilingual staff, families, and volunteers can talk about the wordless picture books in any language. A few favorite wordless picture books include: *The Red Book & The Red Again Book* by Barbara Lehman, *Flashlight* by Lizi Boyd, and *A Ball for Daisy* by Chris Raschka
- National Geographic Kids' website has a page where you can explore photographs and information about countries around the world. Consider printing some of the photos and including them in your classroom. For example, you might put up photographs of buildings in the block area. (kids.nationalgeographic.com/explore/countries/)
